Scouting Report: Bucs have invested heavily in the passing game with the hope it translates to more wins

Hope and Glory: Keys to the season

Wining in the trenches: The Buccaneers defensive line needs to show up on Sundays. It's really that simple. Tampa Bay has ranked last in the NFL in sacks for two consecutive seasons and allowed a league-high 156 rushing yards per game in 2011. You don't win many games by allowing those kind of stats.

QB leadership: Josh Freeman's resurgence is critical to the Bucs' offense. The Bucs invested big bucks in free agents Vincent Jackson and Dallas Clark, putting a mandate on upgrading the passing game. Now it's time to see if it was money well-spent.

Coaching connection: How will the Bucs respond to new coach Greg Schiano? He brings a toughcop attitude to the team, which is a huge philosophical shift from Raheem Morris - under whose tenure the Bucs were often viewed as lacking focus and discipline.

No Guts, No Glory: Make-it or break-it games

Sept 30 vs. Washington: This is the first game in a critical stretch for the Buccaneerss. The Redskins will bring dynamic rookie quarterback Robert Griffin III to Raymond James Stadium.

Oct. 10 vs. Kansas City: After a bye week, Tampa Bay faces Kansas City in another key divisional matchup. The Chiefs stumbled through last season and are equally hungry for this win.

Oct. 21 vs. New Orleans: Drew Brees will lead the potent Saints offense to Raymond James Stadium. Ideally, the Bucs have to find a way to close out a very tough four-week stretch with at least a 2-1 record.

Quest for Glory: Did you know ...

The Bucs have six projected starters who are former firstor second-round draft picks.

Quarterback Josh Freeman played soccer two or three times a week to get in shape for the season.

The Bucs haven't finished a season inside the Top 10 in sacks since 2004.

Glory Days: Bucs' 5 greatest players

Lee Roy Selmon (1976-1984): The first player picked by the Bucs in the NFL draft, Selmon went to six straight Pro Bowls and was named the NFL Defensive Player of the Year in 1979.

(1995-2008): He started 221 out of 224 games in his Bucs career and is considered one of the best linebackers in NFL history.

Derrick Brooks

(1978-86): A fourtime Pro Bowl tight end, Giles still holds the team record with four receiving TDs in one game (Oc. 20, 1985, Miami Dolphins).

Paul Gruber (1988-99): Spent his entire career

with the Bucs and never missed a snap in his first five years in the league as an offensive tackle.

Doug Williams (1978-82): Although Williams played only five seasons with the Bucs because of a contract dispute, he led them to the playoffs three times and put a losing team on the NFL map.


No Guts, No Glory: Make-it or break-it games


